About Us: Wahluke School District was awarded the Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative late in 2015 in Washington State Cohort 4. This grant started the coalition and a positive community change by increasing general community knowledge regarding drugs and alcohol, increase perceived risk of substance use among our youth, lower use of youth binge drinking and alcohol use and increased community, school and parental protective factors. Gigi Calaway was hired early in 2017 and wrote the first Strategic Plan building a comprehensive prevention plan for the school district and community of Wahluke. Some data establishing change was obtained using a comparison of the Healthy Youth Survey 2016 taken before the grant was awarded and two years later (HYS, 2018) following our initiation of strategic programs and coalition outreach. Data: In 2016, only 63% of WSD students in 12th grade thought using someone else's prescriptions could be harmful whereas two years later nearly 80% responded that it is harmful. Regarding alcohol use and binge drinking: 20% of 12th grade students (HYS, 2016) reported drinking 3 or more days in the past month and one or more binge drinking episodes was reduced to 12% of that age group 2 years later (HYS, 2018).) Wahluke has been recognized for achieving change and positive outcomes in a short time because of their collaborative efforts within the school district and many local community partners. These efforts helped the coalition's Prevention Director secure the Drug Free Community grant late in 2019 allowing the coalition to gain another staff member, We focus on youth 5-18 and include families and those that serve our youth in education programs, information dissemination and creating coalition awareness. Our uniqueness lies in our rural and isolated farming community.

We are at the table of nearly every formal group in the area. We have become recognized as a functioning, helpful group with ties to each sector and are often called upon by various agencies. We attend City council meetings, school board meetings, sit on the board for a local clinic, the safety and security team in the local community, sit on policy boards for behavior and truancy at the school district and have organized the community parade and other events to have our name and purpose shared widely. We invite people to join us through advertising and specifically reach out to parents since they are the smallest group in our coalition.

The strong youth presence we had dwindled during the nearly year-long lockdown from our school. The kids were using hybrid learning and we had very little contact with them We learned they were screen fatigued and tired of zoom meetings so we had to adjust and meet in socially distant ways. They were good about attending the zoom coalition meetings though and even speaking up.

He has worked on several projects to use in the starting up of the school year and at the community event in the summer. He has brought several friends to be part of the youth group and we are excited about the social norms campaign he has started.

We showed some remarkable growth this year as coalition members accepted leadership positions and took the lead in different parts of the coalition meetings. Each leader led a meeting section like highlighting events, activities, introductions or other reporting in the meetings or ran part of it. This was huge for our coalition as our community is new to civic/ meeting procedures and they usually want a staff member to run it or take the lead.

We are eager to get to be back in the school (a hub in our community) and hope the shut-downs are behind us. The parents and many other community sectors are tired of meeting online and hope to get back together to accomplish the work at hand. There are always barriers to progress, but we found clever ways to do outreach and feel like we maintained important partnerships. We did lose a couple youth t o graduation and our beloved chief of Police, but this will give us new opportunities to recruit and refresh ourselves.

We got to collect and analyze data from a Covid Student Survey that our schools participated in. It was great to see the responses and consider what were the risk and protection factors for our kids during covid. We put so much time into reaching parents digitally and in Placticas that we worried about the students, but the parents did their jobs and the kids faired pretty well all thing considered. We felt like it was a win when we saw that the 30 day use rate was considerably lower than usual and attributed it to parents who were engaging in the right conversations with their youth.

Covid continues to be a barrier to our work in the way we used to perform, but it has afforded greater opportunities to connect with sectors that formerly couldn't attend because of our isolated location and distance.
